e are always in search of something or other, it seems—an intangible something that tends to shift and change over the course of our lives, like the tumbling pieces of a kaleidoscope. Sometimes, it is love we seek. Other times, meaning. Or inner peace, freedom from anxiety or guilt. Or perhaps freedom from all that ties us down. And sometimes, it is God we seek. Like the Magi, we too are on a quest for the Holy One.

One afternoon, Tom, a high-school sophomore, stopped by. He asked if we could talk about God—or, more exactly, about what God was like. He had been in a study hall, waiting for the bell to ring, when the person behind him asked, "When you die, do you think you're going to see God?" Tom said he thought he would, but then the other student replied, "Well, you won't, because God doesn't have a body. There isn't something to see."

The bell rang, Tom said, and they never finished the conversation. Tom wondered whether God had a body or not, and, if not, then what was God like? Tom was searching for a God that made sense amidst galaxies and black holes and light years of time, but also a God who was personal and knowable and lovable. He wasn't sure how to put the two together. He had become one of the Magi on a journey to find God. •

Pastor's Point

Dear Parishioners,

Due to the fact that this bulletin has the usual "Our Sunday Readings" with the emphasis upon Sacred Scripture, I have decided to focus upon the JUBILEE YEAR 2025 with the theme "Pilgrims of Hope" which we will have a banner placed in all of our churches as a reminder of this celebration in the life of our Church.

On May 9, 2024, Pope Francis released the Bull of Indiction *Spes non confundit* ("Hope does not disappoint" - based upon Romans 5:5) announcing the Ordinary Jubilee Year of 2025. The Jubilee began in Rome on the vigil of the Lord's Nativity, December 24, 2024. It will conclude in local dioceses the following Holy Family Sunday, December 28, 2025, and in Rome on the Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord, January 6, 2026. The text of the Bull is available on the Vatican website or you may want to refer to the USCCB website and type into you device JUBILEE 2025. The description of the logo follows:



The logo shows four stylized figures, representing all of humanity, coming from the four corners of the earth. They embrace each other to indicate the solidarity and fraternity which should unite all peoples. The figure at the front is holding onto the cross. It is not only the sign of the faith which this lead figure embraces, but also of hope, which can never be abandoned, because we are always in need of hope, especially in our moments of greatest need. There are the rough waves under the figures, symbolising the fact that life's pilgrimage does not always go smoothly in calm waters. Often the circumstances of daily life and events in the wider world require a greater call to hope. That's why we should pay special attention to the lower part of the cross which has been elongated and turned into the shape of an anchor which is let down into the waves. The anchor is well known as a symbol of hope. In maritime jargon the 'anchor of hope' refers to the reserve anchor used by vessels involved in emergency manoeuvres to stabilise the ship during storms. It is worth noting that the image illustrates the pilgrim's journey not as an individual undertaking, but rather as something communal, marked by an increasing dynamism leading one ever closer to the cross. The cross in the logo is by no means static, but it is also dynamic. It bends down towards humanity, not leaving human beings alone, but stretching out to them to offer the certainty of its presence and the security of hope. At the bottom of the logo is the motto of the 2025 Jubilee Year: Peregrinantes in Spem (Pilgrims in hope), represented in green letters.

God bless & remember "Hope Does not Disappoint" (Romans 5:5),

Dear Fellow-Catholics,

For the World Day of Peace, which falls on the 1st of January every year, Pope Francis addressed a Message of good wishes and hope to Heads of State and Government, Heads of International Organisations, Leaders of different religions and every person of good will. Its title is 'Forgive us our trespasses: grant us your peace'.

Hope, which also characterises the Jubilee Year, is the preponderant theme of this Message. Pope Francis invites us to look at the many challenges that severely endanger the survival of humanity and creation with a heart full of hope. To do this, it is necessary to rely on God's mercy. By his forgiving our debts, we will rediscover ourselves all children of the Father, and therefore all sisters and brothers, united on the path of peace.

More concretely, then, Pope Francis recommends three actions that can truly mark a path of peace:

- 1. The forgiveness of the international debt;
- 2. The abolition of the death penalty;
- 3. The establishment of a World Fund that will definitively eliminate hunger.

The Old Testament clearly spells out that it is vain to imagine "either fire, or wind, or the swift air, or the circuit of the stars, or the mighty water, or the luminaries of heaven" as "the governors of the world" (Wisdom 13:2).

Don't give credit to or blame the stars for what you do and who you are. See past them to the God who made them, and who made us, and who cares for all creation.
