hildhood daydreams come peppered with visions of heroes and heroines, movie stars and rock stars, fame and notoriety.

Eventually, however, we adjust our visions of what we can become as we are confronted by the reality of who we are. Seldom, however, are our daydreams and visions big enough. They tend to be only about ourselves, barely including others.

The same may be said about becoming people of faith. Too readily we think of faith simply as our personal decision to believe in God. Faith then becomes one-sided—the prayers we say, the Masses we attend, the Church's rules we obey. Like the people of the prophet Habakkuk's day, we may bemoan, "I cry for help and you do not listen.... [I] cry out to you, 'Violence!' and you do not intervene" (Habakkuk 1:2).

Then, too, our faith and its vision for life are not big enough, for we do not allow room for God to slip into our lives and do what God does. Then, faith is only about ourselves—our needs and struggles and pains. Faith needs to be a surrender to God's vision, not simply for ourselves, but for all of life. [The LORD said,] "The vision is a witness for the appointed time...it will not disappoint. If it delays, wait for it, it will surely come, it will not be late" (Habakkuk 2:3). The difficulty is that we want God to make life perfect for us the way we want it and when we want it. Then, it becomes our vision for life and not God's. •

#### **BISHOP's CORNER**

Dear Fellow-Catholics,

St. Thérèse of Lisieux, whose feast day is the 1<sup>st</sup> of October, is the youngest Doctor of the Church. Having endured life-threatening illnesses when she was an infant and a child, and the heartbreaking loss of her mother when she was only four, Thérèse had to overcome crushing adversity with her powerful faith and determination. She sought to enter Carmel while still a young teenager, and achieved this goal at the age of 15. She was not a martyr or a missionary in the conventional sense, but she offered every small act for love of God, and her teachings have spread far and wide through her autobiography, *Story of a Soul*. Thérèse taught "the little way," which is not about striving for great deeds but rather, doing everything, even small things, with great love.

These small acts make up a lifetime, and make the ordinary extraordinary. St. Thérèse explains how forgiving a slight against you, smiling genuinely when you would rather complain, or even picking up a pin from the floor with love, any of these things can have great worth before God. It all depends on love. In her words: "Without love, deeds, even the most brilliant, count as nothing." This Saint of love died in 1897 at the age of twenty-four. Did you know that 2025 marks St. Thérèse of Lisieux's 100th year as a saint? That is 100 years of roses from heaven, as St. Thérèse is known for granting those who request her intercession, signs of her assistance through flowers. St. Thérèse, known as the "Little Flower," famously said that she would spend her heaven doing good on earth and that, "When I die, I will send down a shower of roses from the heavens."

What a beautiful Patroness we have at our diocese! St. Thérèse, the "Little Flower", the "Roses Sender", pray for us!

### Dear Padre,

Is envy a sin? I find myself becoming very envious of people who have more than I do. I find it difficult to be content with what my family and I have now.

We live in a climate that encourages discontent with what we have. Advertising plays on our feelings of envy and our desire for possessions. In this almost universal rush to possess more and better material objects, Christians are called to a counterwitness. We are called to embrace a freedom and a poverty of spirit that actually rejoices in the blessings of others.



The Tenth Commandment alerts us to the danger of undisciplined envy: "You shall not covet...anything that belongs to your neighbor" (Exodus 20:17). In the New Testament, Jesus says that where our treasure is, there also will be our heart. (See Matthew 6:21.) The real antidote to envy, then, is prayers of thanks for all God has given to us and others. To feel envious, to desire or covet someone else's possessions, is not in itself a mortal sin. But to let that feeling invade your mind, to indulge it and rationalize it, is to let that feeling harden into an envious frame of mind. Then you are flirting with real sin. The grave sin is to allow these envious thoughts to drive you to any injustice or evil. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* sums it up well: "Would you like to see God glorified by you? Then rejoice in your brother's [and sister's] progress, and you will immediately give glory to God" (2540). •


#### A WORD FROM POPE LEO XIV

# What's Expected

#### HABAKKUK 1:2-3; 2:2-4b

#### Reading closely

- I. What is Habakkuk witnessing?

#### THE FIRST READING

#### Why is this happening?

Habakkuk lives in the late seventh and early sixth centuries BC. As he examines the state of his people, the Israelites, he sees injustice,

disunity, and violence. He cries out to God for an explanation. How can a faithful, loving God permit such wickedness and suffering? Why doesn't God do something?

God replies that he will use the Babylonian Empire to punish the Israelites for their sins. God commands Habakkuk to write down what will happen so that when it does, everyone will know that God is in charge. The Babylonians invade and destroy Jerusalem in the early sixth century BC.

#### Faith makes a person patient

Once God has cleansed Israel of its sin, he will show his power over the Babylonians, too. None of this will happen overnight, but it will happen. Habakkuk and others who live justly must wait patiently for things to change.

People who lack faith in God's all-powerful goodness don't believe that any justice is coming. Faith-filled people see beyond the immediate situation to a time when God will change things, even if they don't know when or how this change will come about.

#### THE GOSPEL READING

#### Trees in the sea

It's not clear why Jesus' followers ask for more faith. They might feel overwhelmed by what Jesus expects of them: helping the poor, not causing scandal (vv. I-2), and readily forgiving people (vv.3-4). They might instead want greater faith so that they can do amazing deeds, like casting trees into the sea.

It's also not clear from Jesus' reply if he thinks these followers do have great faith or if he thinks their faith is weak.

In any case, Jesus doesn't increase the faith of his disciples. Instead he tells them how powerful faith can be, then warns that even if they have perfect faith and can command trees to go here, there, and everywhere, they are still only doing what God expects of them.

#### No claim on God

Here servant means slave. Slavery in this setting was very different from slavery in the United States. Some slaves held respectable positions. Some were even held in higher esteem than free persons.

Nonetheless, slaves were in a different situation than wage-earners. Day laborers rightly expected to be compensated for their work, but slaves had to do everything their master demanded without expecting any material reward or even a word of praise.

The master in this scenario seems to have only one or two slaves because normally slaves who plowed fields or herded animals didn't also cook and wait at table. This slave must have had his hands full, but however hard and well he works, he can't expect anything from his master.

We can't expect anything, either. Since everything we have is from God, we can't do anything that doesn't ultimately come from God.

#### Note on "apostles"

We don't know why Luke uses the word apostles in this passage instead of disciples (v.5). He might have wanted to distinguish between all of Jesus' followers (who are called disciples, including the Twelve) and the future leaders of these followers (apostles). Even if Luke is making this distinction, Jesus' words still apply to all who put their faith in him.
