This marble statue by the baroque sculptor Gian Lorenzo Bernini commemorates the life of Pope Alexander VII. It sits above the *porta della preghiera*—the side door of St. Peter's Basilica—and it shows the Pope kneeling in prayer. The Pope was known to prayerfully reflect on his death, and supported many beautification projects in Rome.

Civil or religious authority should be a service. Public authority is conferred upon a person by election or

appointment in order to promote the common good. Far from a career of self-aggrandizement, it's a call to place the good of others before one's own.

When speaking of this, Jesus places the emphasis on trustworthiness. Those delegated authority are there to serve and to honor the confidence given them. That's why financial or political corruption is so grievous. People who first win the trust of others only to misuse it by taking advantage of them violate their mandate. And when trust is lost in public life and personal relationships, life becomes a walk through a valley of fear where we are governed by self-preservation. Truly then, we become what the Latins wrote: "Man is a wolf to man."

So be worthy of the trust your family, clients, and others place in you. Be worthy of the confidence God has bestowed with all the talents he has given to use for the good of others. Make your life a responsible gift to others and rejoice in their flourishing more than your own!

Pastor's Note

Dear friends,

The Gospel reading this Sunday is inviting us to be smart with the goods of spiritual life in the same way we are smart with the goods of this world. If we run the risk to be left without money, for instance, or without a job, we know what to do, we act, and we are smart and resourceful, and we put all our energies and capacities in trying to resolve the situation. However when it comes to the goods of the spirit, our relationship with God and Jesus Christ, our salvation and the duty to transmit faith to others often we do not apply ourselves in the same way: definitively we do not invest our time and energy in the things that have to do with our inner life (and that of others) as we do with the things of our external life (work, money, goods, social life). Yet spiritual goods are the goods that are really ours, and if we have traded well with them we will enjoy them forever in the kingdom of the Father, while the external goods first they do not really belong to us: they belong to this world, and this world will pass away. This is why Jesus calls richness "dishonest": because the good of this world will betray us, and the person who has invested his own life in the richness of this world, even if he gained them with honest world, will in the end be disappointed and it may end up discovering that having wasted all the energy in the things of this world, he did not have time to accumulate the true riches, which are the riches of the soul! The Lord so tells us: BE SMART! Invest your time and energy in the true goods that really belong to you! Fr. Attilio.

During the first six months of 2019, approximately seven million people were forced to migrate within their own countries as a result of extreme weather and natural disasters. This information is based on research presented by the Internal Displacement Monitoring Center (IDMC) in Geneva. According to experts, this phenomenon has reached a historic level. The worst effects of natural disasters up until June of this year, in addition to other disasters, were cyclone "Fani" in India and Bangladesh and cyclone "Idai", which struck mainly Mozambique, but also Malawi, Zimbabwe and Madagascar. Flooding in areas such as Iran, Ethiopia, Bolivia and the Philippines had similar devastating effects. According to experts, extreme phenomena such as storms, floods and droughts are the result of climate change due to global warming. Jan Egeland, Secretary General of the Norwegian Council for Refugees, describes the results presented by IDMC as "shocking". Additionally, 3.8 million people fled to other parts of their countries in the first half of this year due to conflicts and violence. A particularly large internal migration has been recorded in Syria, Yemen, Afghanistan, Libya and the Democratic Republic of Congo. By the end of this year, the number of people migrating due to weather could increase to more than threefold; twenty-two million, as stated in the IDMC report. The reason for this is more susceptibility to violent weather phenomena that occur usually in the second half of the year. Thus, 2019 may be one of the most historic years for disasters since the beginning of analysis by IDMC. "The fact that most escapes are associated with hurricanes and floods leads to the conclusion that mass migration due to extreme natural disasters will become the norm" the Geneva body predicts. Do I want to scare you? No. Right now Christians around the world celebrate the Season of Creation. It began on the 1st of September, the Day of Prayer for Creation, and ends on the 4th of October, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi. Dear Padre,

Is withholding or withdrawing life support a form of euthanasia?

Thile it's always morally wrong to kill an innocent person, it can sometimes be morally right to allow someone to die. This implies that it is sometimes morally wrong to allow a person to die. To withhold antibiotics from a person who has every chance of recovering and living a full life if given the medication would be morally wrong.

But there are times when we must accept that our death is inevitable and that additional medical treatment will place an excessive burden on us and



our caretakers, with little benefit. To refuse such treatment is not a form of suicide: rather it's a decision to allow the dying process to take its natural course. The key words here are excessive burden and little *benefit*. When is using a ventilator too burdensome to bear and able to be withdrawn? When is the natural care of nutrition and hydration failing to do what it should? Such life-sustaining treatment or care

may be too burdensome for some but not for others.

A young person after a car accident may be left a quadriplegic and unable to breathe without a ventilator. He might consider the ventilator an extraordinary means of preserving life and want to discontinue its use. Any determination that disregards the value of this person's life—by the patient himself or anyone else-must be avoided. Ultimately, such judgments shouldn't be made without a careful review of Catholic moral teaching, medical and spiritual consultation, and a well-formed conscience. -Sundaybulletin@Liguori.org
