

One for All and All for One

ne day, I asked the eighth-graders I was teaching to imagine themselves on a fantasy journey. They had to pretend they were flying across the ocean in a small airplane when suddenly the plane has engine trouble. The pilot manages to land on a sandy island beach. Everyone survives, but a few passengers are injured.

The captain divides the passengers into groups, each with a specific task. One group is responsible for finding food; another for water; another to explore and map the island; another to care for the injured. After explaining the scenario, I divided the eighth-graders into groups of four or five to complete the same "pretend" tasks—to create a set of rules by which to live until they were all rescued. The rules each group created were much the same: share everything, no hoarding, no fighting, obey the captain, no stealing,

those who do not work do not eat. In effect, these eighth-graders created their own "commandments," enabling the community to survive in its own kind of desert, likely in the same way the Ten Commandments helped the Israelites.

The teachings of Jesus do not abrogate the original Ten Commandments. They continue to hold a great deal of wisdom for surviving as a community. Jesus taught us to focus on how our behavior shapes the sort of individuals we become and, ultimately, what sort of community we form. What flows from one's heart, Jesus taught, reveals who we are both alone and in community. *

Bishop's Corner...

Dear Fellow-Catholics,

Pope Francis has established the 1st of September as the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, encouraging the Catholic community around the world to pray for our common home.

The day is inspired by Pope Francis' landmark encyclical Laudato Si', which calls on "every person living on this planet" to care for our shared Earth.

On this occasion, the Holy Father writes a message addressed to the Catholic Church and to all people of good will. The theme for 2024 is "Hope and Act with Creation" which draws its inspiration from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans.

In his message, Pope Francis encourages us "to live an incarnational faith, one that can enter into the suffering and hope-filled "flesh" of others; to join forces to help to rethink, among other things, the question of human power, its meaning, and its limits; to extend harmony among humanity and to creation in the sense of responsibility for a humane and integral ecology, the path of salvation of our common home. With the assistance of the Holy Spirit seek to live a life that becomes a song of love for God, for humanity, with and for creation, and that finds its fullness in holiness."

FIRST READING - Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-8

Moses said to the people: "Now, Israel, hear the statutes and decrees which I am teaching you to observe, that you may live, and may enter in and take possession of the land which the Lord, the God of your fathers, is giving you. In your observance of the commandments of the Lord, your God, which I enjoin upon you, you shall not add to what I command you nor subtract from it. Observe them carefully, for thus will you give evidence of your wisdom and intelligence to the nations, who will hear of all these statutes and say, 'This great nation is truly a wise and intelligent people.' For what great nation is there that has gods so close to it as the Lord, our God, is to us whenever we call upon him? Or what great nation has statutes and decrees that are as just as this whole law which I am setting before you today?"

RESPONSORIAL PSALM - Psalm 15:2-5

R. The one who does justice will live in the presence of the Lord.

Whoever walks blamelessly and does justice; who thinks the truth in his heart and slanders not with his tongue. **R.**

Dearest brothers and sisters: All good giving and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no alteration or shadow caused by change. He willed to give

us birth by the word of truth that we may be a kind of firstfruits of his creatures.

Humbly welcome the word that has been planted in you and is able to save your souls.

Be doers of the word and not hearers only, deluding yourselves.

Religion that is pure and undefiled before God and the Father is this: to care for orphans and widows in their affliction and to keep oneself unstained by the world.

GOSPEL - Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

When the Pharisees with some scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus, they observed that some of his disciples ate their meals with unclean, that is, unwashed, hands.— For the Pharisees and, in fact, all Jews, do not eat without carefully washing their hands, keeping the tradition of the elders. And on coming from the marketplace they do not eat without purifying themselves. And there are many other things that they have traditionally observed, the purification of cups and jugs and kettles and beds.—So the Pharisees and scribes questioned him, "Why do your disciples not follow the tradition of the elders but instead eat a meal with unclean hands?" He responded, "Well did Isaiah prophesy about you hypocrites, as it is written:

This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrines human precepts.

You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition."

He summoned the crowd again and said to them, "Hear me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile.

"From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile.

Dear Padre,

Do Christians need to follow the Ten Commandments, or are they the "Old Law"?

There is nothing arbitrary or old-fashioned about the commandments of God. The Ten Commandments, given to us by the Author of the World, are found in Exodus 20:2–17. They are: (1) I, the Lord, am your God. You shall not have other gods besides me. (2) You shall not take the name of the Lord, your God, in vain. (3) Remember to keep holy the Lord's day. (4) Honor your father and your mother. (5) You shall not kill. (6) You shall not commit adultery. (7) You shall not steal. (8) You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. (9) You shall not covet your neighbor's wife. (10) You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

The first three Commandments were meant to guide us in our relationship with God; the remaining seven Commandments pertain to our relationships with others. Jesus gives us a new motivation for keeping the Commandments—the motivation of love. He gives a double commandment: love of God and love of neighbor (Mark 12:28–34). Saint Paul tells us these new commands fulfill those of the Old Law (Romans 13:8–10); and John writes that keeping the Commandments simply out of fear of punishment is not enough: love must be the driving force (1 John 4:18). *



Pastor's Points

Dear Parishioners,

All of today's readings illuminate God's call to wholehearted obedience. Deuteronomy 4 names two purposes of God's holy law:

drawing other nations to Israel's God.



James picks up on the theme of fruitful obedience and applies it to Christians. He uses three metaphors to show how intertwined our lives are with God's "word of truth" (that is, the Scripture, or God's law): we are the infant children of the Word; we are like the first figs blossoming the Word's tree; and we are the soil in which the Word is planted. Our lives are bound up with God's Word, in such a way that to hear the Word without living it out would be to turn away from our parent, to wither on the tree, or to dry up and crack as desert soil.

Finally, Mark's Gospel warns that obedience to the law must be deeper than mere observance. Our obedience should be inward, coming from hearts turned toward God. Mark warns, rather literally, against paying "lip service" to the law without loving God with the heart. The purpose of God's holy law is inner transformation leading to abundant

I believe that there are some ways to monitor the effectiveness of the above within, namely if this interiorization is taking place would others notice a change (or changes) within me and maybe they will say such, but also do I notice such a change (or changes) within me and experience how others relate to me? When you pray the Our Father, you say "...thy (God's) will be done," not "my will be done." Try God's way for a change and see or better yet EXPERIENCE what happens.



Pure & Undefiled

JAMES 1:17-18,21b-22,27

Reading closely

- I. What do you think of the words and phrases that James uses to describe God?
- 2. What might be examples of God's good giving and perfect gifts?
- 3. How do people falsely convince themselves that they're acting on God's word?
- 4. What groups of people are the most vulnerable in our society today?
- 5. In what ways are people stained by the world?
- 6. What does James seem to mean by religion?

Living the word

- 7. How do you evaluate whether you are more a doer or a hearer of God's word?
- 8. How can you humbly welcome God's word?
- 9. What challenges confront you as you try to live pure and undefiled?

THE SECOND READING

Exhortation

This letter draws more from Jesus' teaching than any other letter in the New Testament. It urges us to live justly and morally because Christ will hold us accountable for our actions (5:8-9). There is no time to waste as we seek to know and live God's word.

Good gifts

By insisting that God gives good gifts, James pointedly rejects the notion that God tempts people to sin (see vv.13-14). On the contrary, the one who gave us light itself acts with unfailing goodness (v.17).

In desiring only good for people, God brings them to new life through baptism and the proclamation of his word (v.18). Like the first crops gathered during a harvest, those who heed God's word are sure to enter eternal life.

Doers of the word

God's word challenges us to live differently. As we hear God calling us to change the way we speak and act, James warns us not to ignore what we've heard.

God's word, like the Christian religion itself, demands radical action. We should help others, especially those in need. In the Old Testament orphans and widows represent the weakest members of society.

James also warns us not to conform to the values of our culture (the world).

MARK 7:1-8,14-15,21-23

Reading closely

- I. Why might the Pharisees and scribes have come from Jerusalem to hear Jesus?
- 2. What might these religious authorities expect Jesus to say?
- 3. What do you think Jesus' disciples feel about the presence of these other authority figures?
- 4. What effect might Jesus' use of scripture have on the religious authorities?
- 5. What concerns run through this passage?

THE GOSPEL READING

Pharisees

Pharisee seems to mean "separated one." Pharisees drew from both the Jewish scriptures and other teachings and practices in order to help their fellow Jews preserve their identity and traditions during the Roman occupation of their land.

Pharisees represent only one form of Judaism. Their mostly negative portrayal in our Gospels reflects a later stage of conflict between Jews and Christians. Some Pharisees were compassionate and just and inspired others to act likewise.

Ritual purity

Hand-washing and purifying refer to ritual cleansing not personal hygiene. Jewish law stipulated that objects and people be ritually purified in certain circumstances, such as for use in worship.

The Pharisees seem to have made ritual hand-washing before every meal a requirement for all Jews. Their expansion of this law is an example of the tradition of the elders.

Contesting authority

When the Pharisees ask Jesus about hand-washing, they're really asking him to justify his entire ministry. They question whether he truly speaks for God.

Jesus responds by first quoting a passage from Isaiah in order to indicate that the Pharisees have taken over rules about holiness so completely that they've lost touch with what God wants. By quoting scripture, Jesus also indicates that he is the true teacher of God's law.

Rendering holy

Jesus next echoes a big theme of the Jewish scriptures: worship is meaningless, even sacrilegious, if the worshiper doesn't act justly and morally.

However, when Jesus declares that nothing from outside can defile a person, he contradicts scripture, which now makes him seem unfaithful to God's law. There are two reasons he speaks so boldly.

- As God's Son, Jesus has authority over God's law.
 Therefore, he's the only one who can correctly interpret or change it.
- Jesus brings about a new era of salvation in which he purifies people. Therefore, the criteria of holiness in this new era is obedience to Jesus.
