Life Out of Focus



found myself angry the other day, as we all do, I suppose, whenever we put our foot in our mouth, or forget about an important engagement, or scramble whatever it was we had hoped would be picture-perfect. What I had scrambled was a homily. For some reason, the image came out wrong, or the example did not fit, or it just did not come together the way I had hoped. And I was angry with myself to the point that it caught me off guard. It was an unexpected glimpse of what I didn't want to admit: the fact that the way people might perceive me as a preacher had taken on more importance than preaching God's word. Life had gotten out of focus. A perspective had been lost.

It happens to us all in the course of our lifetimes, and more than once. Grades become more important than learning, or being right more important than the relationship, or the address of where we live more important than the people living together. It happens between parent and child when a parent places greater significance on the son's or daughter's profession than on that son's or daughter's happiness. Like in the parable of Jesus, where we sit at table takes on greater meaning than the people who gather or the meal that is shared. That is what pride does. It distorts what is real and shifts the focus of life to ourselves. The antidote? A prayerful awareness of who we are and who God is.

Bishops Corner

Dear Fellow-Catholics,

Alagad ni Maria, a Filipino religious order with priests in the Diocese of Orange, California, recently purchased a 1.4 acre property in Anaheim. On this property, they opened the first Filipino Catholic Center in the U.S., named the Poong

Nazareno Filipino Catholic Center. The center takes its name from a Black

Nazarene image; Poong in this context is a Tagalog word for God or Master. Devotion to the Poong Nazareno is the second most practiced popular devotion in the Philippines, with a yearly procession attracting millions. The original image in the Philippines was brought from Mexico in 1606.

The Poong Nazareno Catholic Center isn't intended to be another parish. Instead, it provides programs of faith formation and cultural education to Filipinos in Southern California, especially youth, as supplements to the sacramental life in parishes. Still, a key component of these programs are Masses for Filipinos, celebrated in English, Tagalog, and other Filipino dialects.

The Poong Nazareno Center includes a 180-seat chapel, classrooms, a fellowship hall, a music room, offices, and a kitchen. There are also plans to build a rectory for visiting priests, adjacent to the present structure. The programs offered will prioritise the cultural and spiritual needs of the 90,000 Filipino

Catholics in Southern California. Nevertheless, the zeal enlivened by the center will likely inspire many to spread the joy of their culture and faith beyond California's borders.

Dear Padre,

Is it sacrilegious to throw away a sacramental?

"Sacramentals do not confer the grace of the Holy Spirit in the way that the sacraments do, but by the Church's prayer, they prepare us to receive and dispose us to cooperate with it" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1670). Therefore, sacramentals confer grace through the Church's power of prayer and, if blessed, should not be thrown away but burned and/or buried. If the object has not been blessed, it can be discarded; however, it could also be donated to a Catholic ministry (school, prison, hospital, etc.) that would benefit from its distribution. (If a religious object was included in an unsolicited appeal letter from a charitable organization, it is safe to assume that it was not blessed.)

If the object is worn or broken, it should be substantially altered so that it loses its form as a sacramental and then returned to the earthly elements. For example, a worn scapular should be burned and the ashes buried; a damaged statue should be further broken into smaller fragments and buried. A European tradition on

the Vigil of the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist (June 23) is to burn old sacramentals in bonfires and bury the ashes. Burning and/or burial respects the sacred nature once held by these items and prevents their adaptation for trivial use. Reverence and discretion are proper for whatever method of disposal.

The first week of classes should be among the most joyful moments of the school year.

On Wednesday morning, it was instead a moment of unspeakable trauma for the Annunciation Catholic Church in Minneapolis and a moment of heartbreak for the rest of America.

Gunfire pierced the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. Two children were killed. Seventeen more were wounded. Fourteen of them children. The entire Catholic family across America and the world is shaken. We weep. We grieve. And we turn to Christ, who alone can bring peace where evil has left devastation.

CatholicVote stands in deep solidarity with Archbishop Bernard Hebda, the priests, the families of this community, and the faithful of the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis. Their suffering is our suffering. Their wounds are the wounds of the Body of Christ.

From Rome, Pope Leo XIV sent a message of profound sorrow and fatherly closeness:

"His Holiness Pope Leo XIV was profoundly saddened to learn of the loss of life and injuries following the shooting that took place at Annunciation Church in Minneapolis, and he sends his heartfelt condolences and the assurance of spiritual closeness to all those affected by this terrible tragedy, especially the families now grieving the loss of a child."

We join the Holy Father in commending the souls of these little ones to the embrace of Almighty God. We pray fervently for the wounded, for their parents, for first responders, and for the medical teams fighting to heal bodies and hearts.

But we cannot stop at grief. This tragedy must stir us. Violence has no place in churches.

At this time of anguish, we invite every person of faith to rally in prayer, storming heaven for the children, their families, and the Catholic community of Minneapolis.

May the Apostolic Blessing of the Holy Father bring "peace, fortitude, and consolation in the Lord Jesus" to Minneapolis and to all who mourn.

And may the light of Christ overcome the darkness that struck at innocence this week.
