BISHOP'S CORNER

Dear Fellow-Catholics,



Last year I promised to the parishioners of St. Theresa's Parish that I would dedicate this year's Palm Sunday sermon to the role of the donkey in the history of salvation. I think others might enjoy this particular reflection as well, so here it is.

The donkey seems to be inscribed in the history of salvation. The Old Testament mentions it one hundred and thirty-eight times, and the New Testament five. The donkey appears in the most critical moments of Christ's life, always humbly staying by his side. His back serves Mary and Baby Jesus, while fleeing to Egypt. It should not be surprising, then, when legends and fairy tales were created that the characteristic cross-shaped fur on the back of an animal is seen as a gift from God Himself.

The sign of the cross fell on the back of the donkey and remained on his skin. What's more, this dark mark on the back, protecting from all dangers, has been inherited by donkeys in all subsequent generations. At all times, the donkey remained patient and modest. As he wandered through the desert, he learned to feed on thistles and dry food (Walloon legend).

The donkey is one of the first to worship the Most High: On the third day, after the birth of the Lord, Mary left the cave and went to the stable. There she placed the Baby in a manger and an ox and a donkey, kneeling, worshiped him (Apocryph of the Second Gospel of Pseudo-Matthew).

The donkey is a persistent and tireless companion on which Jesus entered Jerusalem, as prophesied by the prophet Zechariah: *Behold, your King is coming to you, just and victorious. Humble goes on a donkey.*

So why the donkey? Donkeys are herd animals, but will pair off with a best friend donkey buddy for life. They are used to hard labour; are clever and consistent in action and always strive for a set goal only expecting in return, food, respect and the opportunity to rest. Disregarded or unduly reprimanded, they will show their donkey's stubbornness. Humans can only envy them for their prudent stubbornness. They have a logical, flexible approach to problem-solving able to efficiently overcome the difficult road. At the same time, under the influence of too much pressure, they know when to lie down. They always defend their territory and members of their herd. If one falls under the weight of a load, the others will remain in solidarity with him. They have excellent memories, remembering places, people and their kin even up to 25 years. They like to be with humans; hence they are used in Onotherapy as a form of Hippotherapy. They work perfectly because they are affectionate, sensitive, loyal, sociable and curious. At the same time more submissive and less timid than a horse. Donkeys should never be underestimated. That is the reason the donkey is the perfect hero of children's stories, and a faithful companion of Jesus.

Easter traditions are usually associated with chickens, rabbits or lambs. It seems that there should be more space for the good donkey.

Have a good Palm Sunday and a blessed Holy Week!
